State Of Missouri County of Cape Girardeau. I
A declaration in Order to obtain the
benefit Of the act Of Congress of the 7th Of June
1832. On the 2nd day of December in the year of
our Lord One thousand eight hundred and thirty two
Personally appeared before the Justice Of the County
Court of the County Of Cape Girardeau aforesaid, in
Open court Mitchell Fleming a resident Of the
Cock township in the County of Cape Girardeau and
State of Missouri aforesaid aged seventy One year and
Eight months Who first being duly sworn according to
law; Next on his oath made the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the
act Of Congress passed the 7th 1832; That he volun-
teered in the year 1777 in the County Of Rowan in
the State Of North Carolina, in Order to supply a draft
to be made for the term of five months; That he was
first mustered into the Company Of Captain Craig at
the cross roads near Charlotte North Carolina; The
Colonel who commanded the regiment into which he
was mustered was Colonel Frank Lock; and the
General who commanded the brigade, or the troops in
that section, was General Rutherford; that from
the cross roads above mentioned, he marched with the
troops to the ten mile Spring (so called) ten miles
north of Charleston South Carolina, that he lay there
with the troops, two or three weeks, and from thence
marched with the troops to a place called Petersburg
twenty miles above Savannah on Savannah river near
the line between South Carolina and Georgia; at the
place last mentioned he with the troops above men-
tioned joined the regular army under the command of
General Lincoln, that he continued under the command
of the officer above mentioned reconnoitering up and
down the Savannah river; the American army general-
ly on the east side of said river and the British army
on the west; that he was in a small engagement
on the Savannah river, while defending a landing
or preventing the British troops from crossing the

given at a place called ^{the} Camp Island, that he re-
mained with the troops at the place above mentioned until
the five months expired and was then properly discharged
And further he states that in the year 1782 he
was drafted or enlisted in the County of Rowan in the
State of North Carolina aforesaid and was mustered into
a company of horse under the command of Captain
James Stevenson, that he marched with the com-
pany above mentioned, in a Regiment of horse and
foot under the command of Colonel Stuart, to meet
the British at Wilmington North Carolina, but be-
fore reaching Wilmington was ordered to stop ^{at} Deep
river about fifty miles above Fayetteville, having been
informed that the British had evacuated Wilmington,
that the horse company to which he was attached was
employed in reconnoitering the Country about Deep
river, suppressing the Tories, disaffected &c; that
he served with the troops above mentioned two months
during which time they took about twenty Tory or
disaffected persons and conveyed them to Salisbury
Rowan County North Carolina where he received a
written discharge; that not then or since believing
that the discharges he received aforesaid, would
be of any service to him, they have been both lost
from his possession, and cannot now be found

That the said Mitchell removed from North
Carolina to Cape Girardeau County Missouri, in the
year 1819 where he has resided ever since. that he
has no documentary testimony in this Country by which
he can establish the facts above related

The said Mitchell hereby relinquishes every
claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the
presently and declares that his name is not on
the pension roll of the agency of any State

And to the Interrogatories prescribed by the War
Department & put by the Court, the said Mitchell hav-
ing answered and says as follows

1st I was born in Kent County in the State of Delaware in the year seventeen hundred and seventy one and I have my age recorded in my family bible at my house about twelve miles from this place (Jackson) I had it entered by James Nixon a school master taken from the family records of my father,
"I belonged to the militia, and there was a doubt to be made, and I volunteered on the first call and on the second the militia were classed and the class to which I belonged were called out, the first being for five months and the second for two months, both of which terms I served.

I was acquainted with General Lincoln Commandant of the regular troops at Purgatory on the first campaign and with Colonel Stues Commandant of the militia from Wilkes County and Colonel Packer of Guilford County; also Commandant of the militia during the last Campaign and with Captain James Stevenson of the militia; We having not reached the regular army until the British army had evacuated Wilmington as aforesaid; the first tour I served in the company of Captain Craig, the second Capt Stevenson. I knew while on my first tour, Colonel Sock and Lt Colonel Prevost of the militia and their Regiment the only one I knew or served in on the first campaign.

2^d After serving the first tour of five months I was discharged by Captain Craig, before mentioned, after serving the second tour of two months under Captain Stevenson, I was discharged by Captain Stevenson at Salisbury, both of which discharges have been lost. I did not consider they would be of any service and after a long time they were mislaid or destroyed.
3^d I am known by Col^l Samuel P. McKnight and Andrew Martin Esqr one of the Justices of the County court; with General Munsom Hanney, with

Honorable Alexander Buckner Senator in Congress;
Franklin Cannon Esq. Senator from this County, Peter
R. Garrett Clerk of the County Court, and with the
Reverend Thomas P. Green all of whom reside near
me, who can testify as to my character for Veracity and
their belief of my services as a Soldier of the Revolution
Among whom I have lived for twenty years, and I believe
all can testify to my character for Veracity

Oleiver Harris Senr of lawful age being first duly
Sworn states that he has been personally acquainted with
Mitchell Fleming for forty years, first in the County
of Rowan North Carolina when they were young men
together that is immediately after the revolutionary war
and heard said Mitchell Fleming often speak of
having served in the revolution as also others speak-
ing of the same circumstances, and that he was gen-
erally reputed by the neighbors there as a Soldier of the
revolution, That for nearly thirty years he was inti-
mately acquainted with said Fleming, in North Car-
olina, most of the time being his very near neighbor
Then they moved to the State of Missouri at the
same time, or within a few months of each other,
that they have resided and are residing at this time
within a very short distance of each other, as neigh-
bors: That for about fifteen years last past, he
said Mitchell has been a ruling Elder in the pres-
byterian Church; All of the time since their ac-
quaintance he said Mitchell has been esteemed and
respected by all who knew him as a man of truth
and integrity.

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim S. 16810 it appears that Mitchel Fleming was born in 1761 in Kent County, Delaware.

While a resident of Rowan County, North Carolina he enlisted in 1777, served five months as a private in Captain Craig's Company, Colonel Francis Locke's North Carolina Regiment and was in an engagement at Cany(?) Island on the Savannah River.

He enlisted in 1782 and served two months as a private in Captain James Stevenson's Company, Colonel Isaacs' North Carolina Regiment.

In 1819 he moved from North Carolina to Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, where in Apple Creek Township he was allowed pension on his application execut-

ed December 22, 1832 aged seventy-one years and
eight months. He died April 15, 1837. *(from A.B.)*

It is not stated whether he was ever married.

The above noted is the only soldier named Mit-
chel Fleming found on the Revolutionary War records
of this Bureau.

Robert Prerad, Sons of lawful age being first
duly sworn according to law, states that he has been acquaint-
ed with Mitchell Fleming, more or less from some time before
the commencement of the revolutionary war, that they
were long together in the same neighborhood, at that
time Rowan County, State of North Carolina; that they
both belonged to one company in that County; that it
was a custom at the time of the war, breaking out
with great Britain for the soldiers of the Company;
when a call was made to volunteer, that he has
knowledge of said Mitchell Fleming having been out, on
course of duty, but not belonging to the same class in
which said Mitchell did, was never out at the same
time with him; knows that some parts of the com-
pany were sent on an expedition down on the Savannah
River; has no doubt but said Mitchell Fleming rendered
the services in his declaration set forth and mentioned
sworn and subscribed in open court December
22nd 1832 Benjamin Bacon Deputy Clerk } Robert Prerad

med Mitchell Fleming, the applicant, was a revolu-
tionary soldier, and served as he states, and the court
further certify that it appears to them that Thomas P.
Green who has signed the preceding certificate is a
Clergyman resident of this County, and Samuel
D. McKnight who has also signed the same is a resi-
dent of the same County and is a credible person
and that their statement is entitled to credit.
And it is ordered by the court that the said
declaration and certificate annexed above to be
filed as of the record of this court, and a
